Martin Luther King Jr. - Why do we Remember Him?



Martin Luther King Jr. is a name not easily forgotten, prominently associated with the achievement of civil rights. While he is renowned for his I Have A Dream speech, what else did he contribute to the movement that is often looked over? With January 18th having been national Martin Luther King Jr. day, it is a perfectly apt time to look at what he did and how he helped to make such strides in history. Martin Luther King's involvement in civil rights most famously began in the Montgomery Bus Boycott of 1955, following on from Rosa Park's famous refusal to give up her seat to a white American man. King, leader of the newly formed MIA (Montgomery Improvement Association), helped to continue a boycott started by the Women's Political Council, involving taking virtually any other means of transport other than the bus/public transport, such as car sharing or walking, in order to make a political statement through economical means. This put enormous strain on the economy as the majority of bus takers were often African Americans. This continued for just over

a year before the long-awaited ruling of Montgomery federal court in June 1956 which stated that any law requiring racially segregated seating on buses violated the 14th amendment of the U.S. Constitution which guaranteed all citizens, regardless of race, equal rights and protection under the state and federal laws.

From this point on, Martin Luther King's involvement in the civil rights movement grew, using non-violent acts of protest to gain public attention and create change. Some of the events in which he did so include the Greensboro sit-ins of 1960 which protested in favour of desegregated establishments such as public eating areas, libraries, beaches and hotels and the Birmingham Campaign of 1963 also protesting for desegregation. The Birmingham Campaign is an infamous example of unwarranted violent police brutality in response to peaceful protest that led to Martin Luther King's arrest. King wrote the famous A Letter From Birmingham Jail while in prison, partly on toilet paper, to President John F Kennedy, resulting in his release and federal support of enforcing desegregation.

Delivered also in 1963 was King's I Have A Dream speech which helped to achieve the support of one of the most important groups of people needed to create change - middle class white Americans who made up the majority of voters. Last minute, King changed his speech to become the words that will forever remain historic legend -

"I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the colour of their skin, but by the content of their character." "I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal'."

"I have a dream that one day little black boys and girls will be holding hands with little white boys and girls."

The true achievement of civil rights however was finally introduced under the Civil Rights Act of 1964 by President Lyndon B Johnson, the delay in such perhaps partly due to Kennedy's assassination. Regardless of who invoked the long-awaited act, the impression and impact of Martin Luther King's actions were undeniable and certainly contributed to rulings that forever changed the fate of the American people and black Americans in particular.










Flash Games Can Still be Played, Here's How

So to get to the point of this article, there is a way to play Flash games. Flashpoint is an international project, non-profit, started by internet user BlueMaxima. It is a webgame preservation project built with mostly open-source software that can run web-based media. Both versions can be downloaded for free on bluemaxima.org and the main version, Flashpoint infinity, works by allowing you to download and play content at your leisure. It isn't affected by the end of support for Flash Player as the versions of Flash used are held in a portable environment that isn't affected by Windows updates. Flashpoint is available on Windows 7 and up.

So far they have 70,000 games as well as 8,000 animations! The full lists can be found on the website. Flashpoint is easy enough to navigate through and games are mostly found via the search bar. Once a game is downloaded, you can then play them offline! It also supports players other than Flash such as HTML5, Unity Web Player and Java Plug-in. For those concerned about storage, I have found it takes up minimal space and performance.



I wish you a fun time on any subsequent nostalgia trips you may take - it's great rediscovering good memories and creating new ones!

What is What If It's Us about?

From NYT bestselling authors Becky Albertalli (author of Simon vs. The Homo Sapiens Agenda) and Adam Silvera (author of They Both Die At The End) comes a long-awaited collaboration about two very different boys who can't decide if the universe is pushing them together or pulling them apart.

Meet Arthur and Ben.

ARTHUR is only in New York for the summer, but if Broadway has taught him anything, it's that the universe can deliver a showstopping romance when you least expect it.

BEN thinks the universe needs to mind its business. If the universe had his back, he wouldn't be carrying a box of his ex-boyfriend's things.

But when the boys have a chance meeting at the post office, they leave wondering what exactly the universe does have in store for them. What if - in a city of eight million people - they can't find each other again? What if they do ... and then can't nail a first date even after three do-overs? What if Arthur tries too hard to make it work and Ben doesn't try hard enough? What if life really isn't like a Broadway play? But what if it is?

My thoughts and feelings:

Okay, I won't lie... this book took me three weeks to finish. But it's not because of the quality or writing style of the book. I actually loved the writing style, and I would get through a page quicker than normal, but I was in such a reading slump and could not find the motivation to pick it up, even though I really wanted to. I was so happy when I finally finished it and even more excited because around about the same time I was finishing up this book, the sequel got announced and is set to be released Autumn this year! It is titled Here's to Us which I find to be really fitting.

Now, time to talk about the actual book itself!

One of my favourite things about this book is that we get to see both Ben and Arthur's points of view. You are able to understand them as people, even though they're fictional characters and experience their first thoughts and feelings all the way to end. But of course, it was not always sunshine and rainbows (no pun intended) in this love story. There are times where you want to shout at the characters that it's okay and to just ignore whatever bad thing that just happened, but that's u<mark>nfor</mark>tunately not how it works. All you can do is carry on reading and hope that everything turns out okay in the end.

Another thing that I absolutely loved about book is the representation it includes. I'm not just talking about this book surrounding a gay couple, I'm also talking about all the different backgrounds each character has and how they are not just there to help the main couple end up together. Although they do play that role also, it's not their only purpose which happens way too often in books, movies and tv shows in my opinion. There's a diverse cast of characters and there's even diversity in character's family situations and classes. We get to see the insecurities people may feel about their families when introducing someone new and special into the family. "Dinner is almost ready, and I feel like the world's most unnecessary tour guide as I show them around the living room. But when I see Arthur studying every picture hanging from the wall, I remember that hom<mark>e isn't a</mark>bout ho<mark>w b</mark>ig the space is b<mark>ut h</mark>ow we fill it." 
