

# Headteacher's Message

Well, I think I say exactly the same at the start of most newsletters, but my goodness, it is always true, and never more so this year: what a term it's been! And how can we possibly even begin to capture even a snapshot of all that within this newsletter?

On each occasion, we try to draw out some highlights in these pages by way of an introduction to the newsletter that follows, but where do we start on this occasion? With the joyful and affirming Festival of Peace (pages 10 and 11)? With the Enrichment Fair (page 9), in which it is always truly a marvel to see how engaged our pupils are in all that is on offer? With the Upper School Presentation Evening (page 16), at which our pupils' achievements and efforts were celebrated - including those of former pupils - so beautifully? The film tribute to our alumni in the medical and healthcare professions created for this occasion was exceptionally moving.

This term, there was the once-in-a-lifetime chance for our pupils to hear in person from former President of the USA, Bill Clinton, from Secretary of State, Hillary Clinton, and from First Minister, Mark Drakeford, at the University's Great Hall. Early December's Benediction and Carol Service at the Sacred Heart Parish Church in Morriston is always a particularly lovely highlight of the academic and liturgical year for us, providing as it does stillness and time for reflection by candlelight in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. The care taken by the RE and Music departments in selecting just the right items to enhance this beautiful occasion is always evident, and the sense of peace is tangible within the service, sustaining those in the congregation long after the service has ended.

The Annual Cathedral Carol Service held at the end of the term is similarly a highlight, and even more so this year, as we welcomed pupils from three of our primary schools to sing as a Primary Transition Choir, alongside the *Schola Cantorum* (Bishop Vaughan's choir for liturgical events) and with the staff choir, the evening ending with a simply spellbinding performance of Vivaldi's 'Gloria'.

Our pupils also continue to shine academically, and it has been rewarding for them to achieve outcomes reflective of their efforts, from learning earlier in the year that the school had been placed in the Sunday Times Parent Power Guide for 2023 as a school in the top ten in Wales on the basis of our pupils' collective outcomes, to seeing the joy at individual level as our pupils opened their results envelopes on the Year 11 and Sixth Form results days just before the start of this term.



It has also been wonderful to keep in touch with pupils as they have pursued their paths following their years with us here at Bishop Vaughan, and it was a pleasure, during the second week of December, to welcome two of the pupils that went on to study at Oxford and Cambridge last year. Sam and Ceiara kindly returned to us to support this year's Oxbridge applicants by running a masterclass. This willingness to give of their time was appreciated by all who attended!

# Headteacher's Message

The term, then, has been rich, as it always is, in uplifting and special times for our school community, 'bookended' by the Welcome Masses for each year group celebrated by our school chaplain, Father John, and by the Advent assemblies, which began in darkness and then were illuminated by candlelight, reminding us of the Advent message of hope.



As I spoke of at the start of this year's Annual Cathedral Carol Service, while the busy-ness of putting up lights and decorations, of choosing gifts and arranging gatherings can, in their own way, reflect the Christmas message and help us to grown in compassion and generosity, at this time of year, our community focuses on preparing ourselves for Christmas through prayer and reflection. In the service, I read an excerpt from John Betjeman's poem, 'Christmas', which illustrates beautifully the Advent message. The poet paints evocative images of a typical early December in 1950s Britain. He writes of the decorating of homes and churches, of the London shops sparkling with decorations, of the pubs with blazing log fires and town halls festooned with bunting – all so festive and certainly to be enjoyed. He then focuses, however, on what is at its heart – and I share the latter part of the poem with you here, in which we read of the poet's gratitude and awe for the gift of the Christ-child. We cannot help but concur with him that there is nothing - in all of this busy-ness, that can compare with that gift and that truth.

And is it true? And is it true?
This most tremendous tale of all,
Seen in a stained-glass window's hue,
A Baby in an ox's stall?
The Maker of the stars and sea
Become a Child on earth for me?

And is it true? For if it is,
No loving fingers tying strings
Around those tissued fripperies,
The sweet and silly Christmas things,
Bath salts and inexpensive scent
And hideous tie, so kindly meant,

No love that in a family dwells, No carolling on frosty air, Nor all the steeple-shaking bells Can with this single Truth compare -That God was man in Palestine And lives today in Bread and Wine.





All of us here at Bishop Vaughan wish you and your families a blessed, peaceful and joyful Christmas, as well as every happiness and good health in the New Year.



### **Advent Assemblies**




Well done and a huge thank you to the pupils in the Faith Council for putting together such beautiful Advent assemblies, with the support of Mrs. Thomas. Thank you also to Mr. Eynon-Davies and the Music Department for the items that they contributed to these.

The Advent assemblies are an integral part of our Advent preparations for Christmas, and the beautiful prayers, reflections and music were appreciated by pupils in every year group and staff throughout the school.



### The Examen



For a number of years, we have observed a form of prayer called the Examen during Advent and Lent. This is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day or week in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us.

The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience. The Examen has taken place in every classroom each Friday afternoon throughout Advent, and pupils (and staff) were invited to spend a few minutes reflecting on their week. It provided an opportunity to identify the positives and negatives, and to feel a sense of gratitude for our gifts and blessings.

We are continuing this practice throughout this season of Advent, in order to stop, reflect and make the changes that will help us to be the person God calls us to be.

## The Catholic Pupil Profile

While the following information is well-known to the pupils in the older year groups and their families, we include it here for the benefit of those in Year 7 who are just coming to the end of their first term with us here in Bishop Vaughan!

The Catholic Pupil Profile is an approach adopted by many Catholic schools to celebrate and encourage virtues or positive character traits. The profile consists of eight statements, each containing two key virtues as depicted in the diagram on the right.

These virtues come from the gospels and from Catholic tradition, but are fundamentally human intentional compassionate virtues shared by all human beings. They express what it is to be a good person living a virtuous life. We think this is what a well-educated and good person who can make a difference to the world looks like.

Therefore, pupils at Bishop Vaughan School are growing to be:

**Grateful** for their own gifts, for the gift of other people, and for the blessings of each day; and **generous** with their gifts, becoming men and women for others.

**Attentive** to their experience and to their vocation; and **discerning** about the choices they make and the effects of those choices.

**Compassionate** towards others, near and far, especially the less fortunate; and **loving** by their just actions and forgiving words.

Faith-filled in their beliefs and hopeful for the future.

**Eloquent** and **truthful** in what they say of themselves, the relations between people, and the world.

**Learned**, finding God in all things; and **wise** in the ways they use their learning for the common good.

**Curious** about everything; and **active** in their engagement with the world, changing what they can for the better.

**Intentional** in the way they live and use the resources of the earth, guided by conscience; and **prophetic** in the example they set to others.

While we promote all of the virtues throughout school life, each half term we focus on one pair of virtues in order to really explore what these virtues are and how we can cultivate them in our everyday behaviours. During this term, we have looked closely at being attentive and discerning.

Pupils have investigated what it means to be attentive to their experience and to their vocation; and discerning about the choices they make and the effects of those choices. We have encouraged the practice of attentive reflection and discerning decision making: in teaching, in the Examen, prayer and worship; and through the practice and example of school leaders and staff.

### **Enrichment Fair**

The annual Enrichment Fair, which this year was held on 14th September, is always a lovely event, which essentially it follows the format of a university 'Freshers' Fair'.

As we have dozens of clubs and activities every week here at Bishop Vaughan, each group has its own table and stand in the fair, providing information to pupils and advertising the opportunities available. This is not only useful for our new pupils, but a helpful reminder to all pupils of just how much is on offer in terms of extra-curricular activities.

We are keen to nurture active, engaged and enthusiastic learners here at Bishop Vaughan. Involvement in even one or two of the groups can significantly enhance the school experience.

### **Festival of Peace**

We were delighted to welcome so many visitors to our third annual Festival of Peace held from 18th to 22nd September. The Festival was once more a wonderful celebration of who we are, both collectively and individually. At Bishop Vaughan, we are proud beyond words to have no fewer than sixty-seven languages spoken by our pupils and their families! We therefore endeavour to celebrate cultural diversity.

The very vibrant Festival included exhibits from every department with creative responses, within the subject disciplines, to the theme of peace. In addition, there were stalls and displays curated by our pupils, celebrating our pupils' cultural heritages. Visitors to the exhibition were welcomed with music from two of our talented Ukrainian pupils and shown around by our Sixth Form pupil guides. They later enioved refreshments and a programme of music from our choir, who performed items reflecting the theme of diversity, including the beautiful Siyahamba, which is sung in both English and the Zulu language, and which our pupils also performed at the School of Sanctuary Awards in Swansea Arena back in June. 
### **Festival of Peace**

The school's work on celebrating diversity continues throughout the year, led by pupils and staff in the DARA (Diversity and Anti-Racist Action) group that was established last academic year.

### **Our School Development Plan**

As our parents and carers are aware, all schools have in place a school improvement plan to shape their work across the year and in the longer term also. This should encompass the key areas of its work.

Our plan has recently been re-shaped, as we saw the potential for our existing priorities to be organised under the acronym 'PEACE'. We feel that this brings together the key strands of our work in a way that can be readily referenced by staff and pupils, as well as genuinely reflecting the principles that underpin our work.

The key components of our three-year plan remain unchanged, therefore, but they are grouped into five areas under this particularly apt word for us as a community, because peace – in all its forms – is entirely central to all that we do in Bishop Vaughan. This may be through promoting and celebrating our extremely diverse cultural heritages, through exploring the conditions for peace as we do in our annual festival, through living in accord with our principles in terms of the peaceful and ethical stewardship of creation or through holding the words of the scriptures at the heart or our work, such as those in Colossians 3: 14-15 –

"Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts."

Our 'at-a-glance guide' to our existing improvement plan is therefore shown as follows:

Р	Prayer and worship Keeping Christ at the centre of all that we do. Increasing levels of engagement in the prayer life of the school and building upon our provision in this area for our pupils and our staff. Ensuring consistency in prayer and worship in every classroom throughout the school.		
Е	<b>Equity</b> Ensuring that all of our pupils are supported to achieve their potential regardless of any barriers to attainment they face. This is in line with our mission statement. Focusing on the standards achieved by our pupils and on qualifications as a passport to opportunity and social mobility. Ensuring equitable learning conditions.		
Α	Ambition and Attitudes to Learning Shaping and delivering an ambitious and aspirational curriculum. Encouraging our pupils to aspire and to recognise to attendance is central to developing a positive attitude to learning and realising ambitions. Utilising links with external partners to ensure that our learners are supported to achieve their ambitions.		
C	Curriculum and cultural enrichment Curriculum for Wales development, with cultural enrichment and linked learning opportunities in every phase of education. Ensuring access to culturally enriching experiences: music, reading, trips. Developing our Entitlement Charter.		
Е	Engagement Ensuring high levels of engagement in the classroom. Relentless promotion of extra-curricular engagement. Engaging our pupils in leadership activities and engaging ourselves in leadership programmes, research and practitioner development – accessing varied and high-quality opportunities to achieve our ambition of offering an excellent education for all.		

This by no means covers all of our priorities, but we hope that this distilled summary of some of our key focus areas is of interest to parents and carers.

### **Entitlement Charter**

Our Entitlement Charter is a set of commitments that Bishop Vaughan makes to its learners, setting out experiences and opportunities we commit to offering the pupils in our care during their time with us in the school. The Pupil Voice group collaborated on putting these commitments together, and staff throughout the school contributed similarly. The pupils reflected on the experiences that the school has offered them that they have valued and then they worked together to shape the Entitlement Charter to ensure that all future pupils of the school are offered the same opportunities.

Ultimately, the commitments made are intended to ensure that our pupils have access to a wide range of activities, extending their exposure to the arts and to cultural experiences, giving them opportunities to develop interests and skills that will enhance their lives long after they have left school. They are intended to build cultural capital and to develop their knowledge of the local area, of Wales more widely and of the world.

The entitlement charter currently commits to ensuring that pupils of Bishop Vaughan will, during the time from Years 7-11, have opportunities to:



- 1) Participate in Acts of Worship, including Mass, regularly at school
- 2) Learn a new language
- 3) Visit a local beach and a local castle
- 4) Learn to play a musical instrument
- 5) Attend a music concert and hear music performed live
- 6) Take part in a school production
- 7) Sing as part of a choir
- 8) Create artwork in a variety of mediums
- 9) Meet authors and read books of their choice, and have ready access every day to both borrowing and buying books in their time at the school
- 10)Be involved in charitable events
- 11)Keep fit and healthy by accessing extra -curricular sports and the school gym, as well as through participating in PE lessons
- 12) Take part in a residential trip or sports tour
- 13)Attend a workshop or masterclass in an area of interest
- 14)Try healthy foods and develop healthy lifestyles
- 15)Represent the school, whether in sports, in a team such as the debating team or as a member of a pupil group such as the School Council
- 16)Access a very wide range of clubsand societies to develop their skills and interests
- 17) Celebrate the end of their time at BVS together



We would like to invite parents and carers to make three further suggestions that will take our charter to twenty commitments. The commitments are intended to be, as stated, ones that will enhance our pupils' spiritual, cultural and academic development. You are welcome to email your choices to the email address shown here:

### **Welcome Masses**

In October, we celebrated a Welcome Mass for each year group for the new academic year. With readings about community and respect for one another, it was a thoroughly enjoyable way to start the academic year. With sincere thanks to Father John Browne, our School Chaplain, who continues to support our spiritual development in this way.

We are also very thankful that we have been able to celebrate Mass on a weekly basis, every Wednesday morning, in our school Chapel. Themes have included a Mass of Remembrance, and the first Mass of Advent. A wonderful way to start the day!

### **Benediction and Carols Parish Service**



Our first Carol Service took place in the Sacred Heart Church in Morriston on 7th December. It was a service of Benediction and Carols - a beautiful and reflective one with readings and with musical items from our pupils in the Schola Cantorum (the choir that sings for the school's liturgical events) and a truly wonderful start to Advent.

Thank you to Canon Jason Jones, within whose parish the school is situated and who supports the school with weekly visits, for such a lovely welcome and for the thought-provoking homily which focused on the Advent message of hope.



During the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, we had the opportunity to pray by candlelight, finding peace and stillness in prayer. While it was a very cold evening outside, the beauty of the service and of the message that it offered, strengthened and warmed all of those present.



### **Cathedral Carol Service**

On Monday 18th December, we held the second of our two carol services at St. Joseph's Cathedral, Swansea. It was a special joy this year to welcome pupils from several of our cluster primary schools who sang 'Tonight' by Graham Kendrick, this following visits to their schools by Bishop Vaughan's Head of Music, Mr. Eynon-Davies to hold rehearsals. They also joined the Bishop Vaughan choir (the *Schola Cantorum*) and the staff choir for 'O Holy Night' and a truly beautiful rendition of Vivaldi's Gloria to end the carol service. Our pupils and staff found it a privilege and a joy to sing with them and to join our schools together for this very special carol service.



The evening begun with opening prayers and a welcome led by Father John Browne, our school Chaplain, and then we listened to excerpts from John Betjeman's poem, *Christmas*, which tells of the busy preparations for Christmas—the decorating, the gift-buying and the excitement of children, set in a beautifully nostalgic 1950s Britain. While all of those elements can be special, however, and often heart-warming, the poem however then focuses on the true Christmas message and on the most precious gift of all - the gift of the Christchild.

The primary school pupils, the readers, the musicians and our soloists, all contributed to making the evening very special, and once more, the support of Swansea's Music Service in preparing and performing alongside our musicians was greatly appreciated.

As always, the evening brought together many former pupils and staff and their families amongst the congregation, and it served as a reminder of how much it means to us all to be able to gather in this way.



Father John offered a closing blessing and our head prefects then delivered a message of thanks before the last congregational carol and the beautiful Vivaldi Gloria.

Thank you to all who gave of their time and who offered their gifts and talents to make this such a lovely service, and to all of those who joined us at this gathering.

### **Presentation Evening**

This term saw the return of our annual Upper School Presentation Evening. This event celebrates the many different talents our students have demonstrated over the last academic year.

Held on Thursday 26th October, the theme of this year's awards evening was centred around the idea of choices, and during the course of the evening it was clear to see that all of the students who attended the event had made excellent personal choices resulting in really impressive academic achievements and progress.

The guest speaker was Mr. Rob Phillips, our former School Advisor, who gave a thoughtful presentation about the power of education. His message to our students focused on encouraging our pupils to believe that even the seemingly impossible can become possible.

All attending the evening were invited to pause for a moment to reflect on the prizes given in memory of some of our former students and former members of staff, the memory of whom has been, and always will be, an integral part of the Bishop Vaughan community. They will be remembered for all that they stood for and held always in our prayers. This year a new set of awards were given in memory of our former Headteacher, Mr. Joe Blackburn, a man who dedicated his life to education and to Bishop Vaughan.

The event was extremely well attended and we look forward to recognising the achievements of many more students in the future, and in particular to the Lower School Presentation Evening in the Spring term.

### **Legion of Mary**

The Junior Legion of Mary, the charity and prayer-focused group, continues to meet every Tuesday. Pupils have been reflecting on what their faith means to them and how they can live their faith to the full and share their experience with others.

Over the last half term pupils have prayed the rosary, taken part in reflections, created a stall for the Festival of Peace and been more actively involved in their parishes.



As part of the stall for the Festival of Peace pupils added to their previous contributions and focused on the theme "People of Peace", illustrating their ideas and contributions in creative and imaginative ways.







Pupils continue to be actively involved in parish life, supporting events and initiatives at the Sacred Heart as well as across the wider school community.

### **English Department News**

#### The Power of Speech

Speaking and Listening is an integral part of our teaching of English across all key stages. The skills needed are essential for demonstrating understanding, critical thinking and effective argumentation. In addition, they undoubtedly have a significant impact on students' self-confidence and self-expression.

This term, a number of our Year 9 pupils have had the opportunity to participate in two very rewarding and exciting experiences. Two students from 9N share their reflections on these below.

#### A Matter for Debate

On Friday 10th November the Swansea Council Chambers at the Guildhall were reserved not for council members, but rather a group of eight Year 9 students, accompanied by Mr Walters and Miss Riggeard, who would soon learn the wonder of the world of debate. This incredible opportunity was orchestrated by the Seren Academy (and Ms. Siddika too!). Seren is a programme run by the Welsh Government to allow Wales' most able students to flourish through a multitude of super-curricular activities, in this case, through a whole day of engaging in debate.



The students would soon learn of a debate style called MACE, which is far more formulaic than British Parliamentary or Lincoln-Douglas debate styles. This specific type is structured into four segments, Introductory, Exploratory, Extension, and Summary speakers, who all engage in opposing stances to a proposed statement, or 'motion'. The proposition is in favour of the motion - for example, "This house believes it is morally just for vaccines to be mandated in Britain" – while the opposition is against it.



The debate begins with a ten-minute segment, the first half of which is given to the Introductory proposition speaker, where they will define their motion, model, and introduce around two or three of the proposition's arguments. The opposition then does the same; however, they may also rebut whatever the proposition speaker has said. Each speaker will have five minutes, the first and last minutes being "protected time". This process is then repeated with the Exploratory and Extension speakers, until it is the Summary speaker's turn. The role of Summary speaker is vastly different, as they must synthesise the information they have heard throughout the entire debate, and may even be penalised for bringing in a new argument.



The day was fascinating, as the lucky few who were chosen got a taste of debate in its entirety, perhaps one of the best opportunities Bishop Vaughan has yet offered. Currently, they are set to engage in the Swansea finals in January, and if successful in those, the national finals a few months later at Oxford University, a truly enriching moment for all.





The Clintons were joined by First Minister Mark Drakeford and they talked about a huge range of issues, as well as answering questions from pupils.




### **Pupil Voice News**

Should any pupil wish to join this group, we meet on Thursdays in room B4, and you can speak with Mrs. Pole or Miss Siddika for further details.








# **Bishop Vaughan Alumni**

Sign of Peace: linked to the celebration of Holy Mass.


**Cultural Music Suggestion Box**: Music suggestions and requests were gathered spanning all cultures and traditions.








### **Children In Need**

# **End-of-Term Activities**




The last couple of weeks of term have been filled with some lovely activities and also fundraisers for those in need this Christmas.

Parents who have any doubts about what is acceptable should contact the school for guidance. The final arbitrary of what constitutes school uniform lies with the Headteacher and Governors of the school. Please do not rely on information obtained from elsewhere.

### **Years 7-11**

**Blazer:** With school logo (navy) - compulsory garment

**Jumper**: Fine knit jumper with school logo (navy) - non-compulsory

**Tie**: Years 7-11 official school tie

**Socks**: With trousers: dark coloured, or white

With skirts, standard grey or white

**Tights**: Should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and

seamless.

NB socks or tights **MUST** be worn.

Blouse/Shirt: Plain white

**Skirt**: Grey knee-length skirt

**Trousers:** Grey trouser, **NOT** fashion or jeans. No denim, leather, flares,

leggings, skinny style etc.

**Shoes**: Black formal school shoes (leather/artificial leather) with flat or low

heels. Ankle boots may be worn in winter provided they conform to the above regulations (not with skirts). Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy boots (military,

Ugg etc.) are not permitted. No forms of logo.

Outerwear: Pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules.

However, all outer garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured. Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, leather look jacket, no faux fur, tracksuit tops or cardigans.

No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present. Hats e.g. beanies, baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head bands must be plain and dark. There is no

necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at school.

T-Shirt (unisex): Navy with blue/white side panels
Outdoor PE top (unisex) Navy with blue/white side panels
Shorts (rugby): Navy with blue/white side panels

**Footwear:** Soccer and rugby appropriate studded boots and training

shoes as applicable

Shin pads are to be worn for all hockey and football lessons. Gum shields are strongly recommended for hockey and rugby.

### All Items of clothing should be clearly marked with the pupil's name.

### **Sixth Form Uniform**

Blazer: Pupils may wear the new blazer if they wish, however

this is not compulsory for Years 12 and 13.

**Jumper:** Navy, V-necked with official school logo

Tie: Sixth Form official school tie

**Shirt/Blouse**: Plain white, standard school style (not fashion)

NB During the summer term only navy blue polo shirt

with Sixth Form logo may be worn.

**Skirt**: Navy blue, knee length

**Trousers:** Navy blue, black, <u>dark grey</u>, standard design. No denim,

leather, flares, leggings, corduroy, etc.

**Socks**: With trousers: dark coloured, or white

With skirts: navy blue or white

**Tights**: Plain, seamless, navy tights may be worn

**Shoes**: Dark coloured with flat or low heels. Ankle boots may be

worn in winter and sandals in the summer. Trainers and

canvas shoes are not permitted

**Topcoat:** Dark blue/black/grey – single coloured only

Members of Sixth Form are expected to wear the uniform throughout the school day. A single sleeper or a single stud of minimum size may be worn in the lobe. No other piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, nose or tongue piercing. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. greens etc. are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts. Baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Any jewellery must be removed if in the judgement of any staff, instructors or technicians it constitutes a health and safety hazard, especially in laboratories, workshops and PE areas.

## **Attendance**



The Education (School Day School Year) (Wales) Regulations 2006 states pupils are expected to attend school for 190 days a year. Moreover, there is a strong correlation between good attendance and high achievement as set out below:

95-100% attendance	Best chance of success	Your child is taking full advantage of every learning opportunity.
90-95% attendance	At least 2 weeks of learning missed	Satisfactory. Your child may have to spend time catching up with work.
85-90% attendance	At least 4 weeks of learning missed	Your child may be at risk of underachieving and may need extra support from you to catch up with work.
80-85% attendance	At least 5 ½ weeks of learning missed	Your child's poor attendance has a significant impact on learning.
Below 80% attendance	At least 7½ weeks of learning missed	Your child is missing out on a broad and balanced education. You are at risk of prosecution.

### Absence requests from school during term time

We have been closely monitoring absences from school, particularly where attendance falls below 90%. We have written to parents/carers to advise if your child's absence was below 90% in academic year 2022/2023 and that we may require medical evidence for absences this year.

All absence requests within term time will be viewed as individual cases. We kindly ask parents/carers to complete the online form available under the Attendance section of our website. Alternatively please email BishopvaughanA@Hwbcymru.net to request the link to be sent directly.

We will not authorise absence during September or during examination periods.

Headteachers have a margin of discretion to approve holidays and will have regard to a number of factors which include the impact on the continuity of learning. If the Headteacher does not give permission and a parent takes a pupil on holiday the absence will be marked as "unauthorised." We would encourage parents to prioritise excellent attendance and to discuss any proposed holidays with the school well in advance.


If the holiday is not authorised then you may receive a penalty notice if the holiday means your child misses 10 school sessions and your child's attendance falls below 90% in the school year to date.

# **Pupil Information Details**

If any of your details have changed, please write or email the school so that our records may be updated. This includes any change to address, contact telephone numbers (especially mobile telephone and emergency contacts), place of work, doctor, or any new medical conditions of which we should be aware.

Please note that it is the policy of the Local Authority that we receive evidence of any change of address.

### **Bus Passes**



Both parents and pupils should be aware that the children should carry their bus pass with them at all times. Pupils could be asked at any time whilst travelling on a school bus, to produce their bus pass as evidence that they are allocated a seat. If pupils have misplaced their bus pass please contact the school office who will organise a replacement.

Also pupils are not allowed to travel on any other bus other than the one that is printed on their bus pass. On several occasions lately pupils have tried to travel on different buses, e.g. to go over to a friend's place after school. This is not allowed and the drivers have the right to refuse entry to pupils who are not allocated to their bus. It is parents' responsibility to collect their children and take them to alternative venues after school.

# **Getting to School**

Parents are politely reminded that pupils who cycle to school **must** wear a helmet and dismount once they enter the school site. Students must not come to school by scooter as this is dangerous to both the user and to pedestrians. We would very much appreciate your co-operation in this matter.

# **Parking Outside Bishop Vaughan**

A letter has been received from the School Community Police Officer asking us to pass on the concerns of local residents in relation to parking and vehicles causing obstructions outside the school from 2.45pm every afternoon.


Police Officers will be patrolling regularly outside the school to take positive action regarding any vehicles which are parked in contravention of road traffic legislation.

# **Mobile Telephones**

If pupils have mobile phones they should note that they are **not** to be switched on or in use inside the school. This includes the buildings, playground and playing field areas, before, during and after the school day.





Parents and guardians are asked **not** to contact their children by phone or text during the school day. If an emergency message needs to be conveyed the school office will take the call and pass the message on. Similarly if a pupil needs to make an emergency call home they just need to go to Student Services.

Failure to comply with these rules will result in the phone being confiscated and kept in the school office for collection by a responsible adult.
