

## Fairyloot Review: Is It Really Worth It? - Liberty Saleh

### What is Fairyloot?

FairyLoot is a monthly book subscription box that focuses on Young Adult and Young Adult/Adult crossover fantasy literature and is based in the U.K. In every one of the monthly boxes, you receive a brand-new Young Adult fantasy novel (very often an exclusive edition and hardback), 5-6 exclusive goodies related to the theme of the box (not including the two Tarot Cards that have amazing artwork of different characters which are collectables) and other items sourced directly from the author. Fairyloot often teams up with big name authors to offer exclusive editions of their existing books and even new releases! These books can be purchased outside of the subscription plan, although active subscribers do receive the luxury of early access to all exclusive releases by Fairyloot. Another amazing thing about Fairyloot is that they announce the theme for each box a month before along with the information of the books that items will be inspired by without saying what they will be specifically. They also do not name the book of the month either, to help keep the surprise factor when opening the box. They do this so that you have enough time to decide, as an active subscriber, if you would like to take a break from receiving a certain box for whatever reason!

## My experience with Fairyloot:

My first box from Fairyloot was the 2021 January box. The theme for this box was 'Greek Mythology' and I loved everything that was included! After being on the waitlist for many, many months, I was not disappointed, and it was definitely worth the wait. The box was black with book quotes around it, topped with the Fairyloot logo. The inside of the box was very pretty with its whimsical patterns. It was all packaged with care, nothing came broken or bent. I will definitely be continuing my subscription with Fairyloot!

What was included in the January 'Greek Mythology' box?

January's book of the month was Lore by Alexandra Bracken which I have been wanting to read for a while now! The book also came with an art print with an author letter on the other side. The book has a slightly different cover to the original with sprayed edges and a pattern running along the side, art on the reverse dust jacket and gold embossing under the dust jacket. It also features a digital signature from the author on the title page.



## What is Lore by Alexandra Bracken about?

In modern day New York, a murderous game is about to begin: the Agon. Every seven years, for one week only, Zeus punishes the gods by forcing them to walk the earth as mortals, savagely hunted by the descendants of ancient bloodlines, all eager to kill a god and seize their divine power and immortality.

After her family was brutally murdered by a rival line, Lore Perseous fled, turning her back on the Agon's cruel promises of eternal glory. For years, Lore has honored her parents' memory by doing one thing – surviving. For years, she has pushed back dark thoughts of revenge. Until now.

### What is Me Before You about?

They had nothing in common until love gave them everything to lose . . .

Louisa Clark is an ordinary girl living an exceedingly ordinary life—steady boyfriend, close family—who has barely been farther afield than their tiny village. She takes a badly needed job working for ex-Master of the Universe Will Traynor, who is wheelchair bound after an accident. Will has always lived a huge life—big deals, extreme sports, worldwide travel—and now he's pretty sure he cannot live the way he is.

Will is acerbic, moody, bossy—but Lou refuses to treat him with kid gloves, and soon his happiness means more to her than she expected. When she learns that Will has shocking plans of his own, she sets out to show him that life is still worth living.

A Love Story for this generation and perfect for fans of John Green's *The Fault in Our Stars*, *Me Before You* brings to life two people who couldn't have less in common—a heartbreakingly romantic novel that asks, what do you do when making the person you love happy also means breaking your own heart?

#### My thoughts and feelings:

I watched the film adaptation of this book a few years ago when it was first released back in 2016 and loved it. Then a while later I was in a bookstore with my mum and saw it on the shelf and realised that it was a book first. I didn't pick it up at the time as the film was still fresh in my mind and I knew that it would be difficult for me to read about something I've already experienced in another format. Since I hadn't watched the movie for a good few years, I thought that I would give it a go and I am so glad that I did because it did not disappoint in the slightest and even ended up exceeding my expectations.

After I finished the book and was left in tears, I thought why not re-watch the movie while the book was still fresh in my mind to try and spot the similarities and differences. There weren't many differences. I don't say this often, but the movie did an amazing job of representing the book. All the main scenes were included, although they did remove Will's sister from the movie (must have been a budget thing!). All the dialogue, which is the best part of any book in my opinion, was featured in the film and I really appreciated that because once you attach yourself to a certain way of things, it's hard to accept that somebody has changed it. Of course, there were some minor scenes that were cut out of the movie since a movie often must stay in a certain time frame. The timeline of things was slightly different towards the end also, but not something so major that it changes the plot in any way.

Now, moving onto the casting! It is honestly some of the best casting I have seen that portrays these characters in both appearance and personality. I could not think of anyone better to play any of the roles. It's very safe to say that justice was done with the casting. The actress who played Louisa Clark (Emilia Clarke) is amazing in everything she does, I loved her in Game of Thrones. And what I realised this time around when watching the film was that the actor who plays Will's dad (Charles Dance) is in Game of Thrones too! I have also loved everything I have seen the actor who plays Will (Sam Claffin) in. This includes amazing movies such as Love Rosie, Enola Holmes, The Huntsman, Snow White and three of The Hunger Games movies. But it wasn't just the main cast that I thought were perfect. Every role, to the smallest one, I thought to be perfectly casted. From the family, to the friends and even to the small side characters that only showed up for one five-minute scene, they were all perfect in their roles. Although, it is possible that the reason I have no issues with the casting, besides some of them being my favourite actors, is because I watched the film first and therefore pictured the actors from the film throughout my reading of the book. Either way, I think it was all very well done and I would like to think that I am not being biased and that this would be my opinion if I had read the book before ever watching the film. Even though the book is usually always better than the adaptation (I have yet to find something that has been able to change my mind), this adaption is definitely one of the few that did the book justice.

I think they feel bad for me.


And then, in the dark, I am alone.
