


Athletics Success

There is always a steady stream of pupils coming to this club on a Wednesday after school from 3:30-4:30pm.




Earlier in the term we made a tasty carrot cake and this is Brian (9.3) with the result.

We ended the term with a delicious Victoria sandwich and here are Mia (7.8) and Megan (7.8) with their results.





2016 Pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela



In the early hours of Tuesday 12th July a party of twenty-one students and eight staff will commence a cycling pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela in Western Spain.

We have been preparing for the onerous 560 mile journey since 2015 and have undertaken more than twenty training rides which have become increasingly

technical and challenging in preparation for the pilgrimage. We will be averaging between fifty and sixty miles a day and will arrive in Santiago de Compostela in time for the feast of Saint James on July 24th. The first day of cycling will take us from St. Jean Pied de Port in France, across the Pyrenees to Roncesvalles, an extremely strenuous climb. Please bear us in mind in your prayers


years. Everyone was dressed to impress and it was a lovely way to end our time at Bishop Vaughan!

Mullany Fund

Pupils Participate in E-Mentoring Publicity Event



Bishop Vaughan pupils participated in a publicity video for the Mullany Fund earlier this month. The Mullany Fund is a charity that supports pupils enter careers in the healthcare, medicine and life science sectors. The Fund runs an e-mentoring scheme that connects pupils to online mentors in fields such as Medicine, Veterinary Science and Biomedicine to offer careers advice and support. A number of BVS pupils have taken part in the e-mentoring scheme and as a result, the Mullany Fund asked our pupils to be interviewed for a short publicity film. The film will be shown to MPs, AMs and educational organisations. The Mullany Fund have also been nominated for an award and, if they win, sections of the film will feature on BBC News.

MAT Opportunities and Activities

BVS has developed a number of opportunities this year to support our more able pupils in their current studies and future ambitions. A wide range of activities have taken place this term, including the Masterclass Programme with Swansea University. A number of lecturers visited the school over the last few months and offered talks on subjects as diverse as regenerative medicine, astrophysics and the media during WW2. Lecturers from the University of South Wales also held masterclasses for pupils on topics including Law, Sociology and English Literature. The programme will be running again from September.

Pupils have also visited Swansea University for a number of events. Year 12 pupils participated in a Medical Physics Day at the university and Singleton Hospital, where they took part in a number of workshops and practical activities. Year 10 pupils attended a Maths Conference and a Psychology/Criminology Taster Day. These were all fantastic opportunities to develop their subject knowledge and assist them with making informed decisions about their futures.

Meanwhile, Year 9 girls were invited to attend a Saturday Science Club at the university. The Club is designed to encourage girls to consider STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Medical) careers, as females are under-represented in these fields. Five pupils from Year 9 have regularly been attending and benefitting from workshops led by experts from the university in topics including marine biology, biosciences and medicine. The pupils have really enjoyed the sessions and have been praised by the university for their positive attitude and enthusiasm.

Two pupils from the Sixth Form also had the opportunity to visit Cambridge University over Easter as part of the school's partnership with the HE+ and Seren networks. These organisations work to widen participation in top universities through a number of activities, including residential visits to Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Baptin and Cinzia spent three days in Cambridge with other students from South Wales and visited a number of colleges, including the historic Christ's College and Trinity College. They also attended an open day at Churchill College and learned more about the application process for Cambridge. Similar opportunities will be available in the future through the HE+ and Seren Networks.

Bishop Vaughan Pupils Win Medicine Summer School Places

Four pupils in Year 11 have won fully funded places at a prestigious Medicine and Healthcare summer school. Gian Hernandez, Carla Bayliss-Clark, Alisha Moran and James Necrews-Morgan applied for the University College London Hospital summer school through the Mullany Fund, a charity that works to widen access to medical careers.




The Mullany Fund has been working closely with BVS over the past year and has offered pupils the opportunity to take part in an e-mentoring scheme which connects pupils with mentors working in healthcare and medicine. The Fund only had six places available in total, which makes the achievement of our pupils even more notable.

Gian, Carla, Alisha and James will be spending a week in London after their exams, based at UCLH. They will participate in a number of practical workshops exploring medical and healthcare careers, including simulated medical scenarios. UCLH is a state-of-the-art training hospital and the pupils will benefit from the latest technology and research during the week. This will be an invaluable experience to support their future ambitions in the field of medicine.

We wish all four pupils the best of luck and look forward to hearing about their experiences on their return.

Year 9 MAT Visit to Swansea University Bay Campus

Year 9 MAT pupils were invited to the new Swansea University Bay Campus in June as part of the Masterclass partnership. The pupils toured the new facilities on the campus, including the Engineering workshops and the new Great Hall. The pupils also participated in an Engineering workshop led by lecturers involved in the Bloodhound Supersonic Car project. The pupils were tasked with working in teams to design and create their own supersonic car. albeit on a far smaller scale and fuelled by rockets. The winning team achieved a top speed of 74 mph with their design, whilst the losing team sadly damaged their car in a small explosion.





The visit was a fantastic opportunity for pupils to gain a taste of university life, as well as develop their team working skills. Kaitlyn, from 9.1 said: 'I really enjoyed the trip. We were given some really helpful advice about how to prepare for university as well as practising wider skills such as communication and team working. Testing the cars was also great fun!'



GA Welsh Wise Quiz 2016

The event took place at the Geography and Planning Department in Cardiff University. Eight teams took part in the event representing four different schools across South Wales. Our girls

Gower Geography Field Trips 2016



2016 is the national 'Year of Fieldwork' and the Geography Department at Bishop Vaughan has made the most of it this term. We have been on two trips, firstly, Caswell Bay and secondly to Pwll Du Bay, both with GCSE classes investigating coastal processes and landforms on the Gower Peninsular.

Caswell Bay

Eighty-three Year 10 pupils were lucky enough to spend a sunny day in May out of the classroom with not only their geography teachers but also Dawn Thomas, a local fieldwork expert from Nature Days. The pupils learnt about the geology of the bay as well as coastal erosion and its associated landforms. The pupils made models of an Arches, Stacks, Stumps and Caves in the sand as well as being involved in a dance session of coastal kungfu!





Pwll Du Bay

Again, GCSE students visited the Gower to collect essential data for their Controlled Assessment which counts for 10% of their GCSE grade. The pupils were again excellent, however, some were luckier than others with the weather! Students completed transects along the pebble beach at Pwll Du investigating the beach profile and sediment shape. Students also recorded data on wave type and longshore drift.

Classics Department

Swansea University Trip

On Tuesday 15th March, 20 students from Years 10, 11 and 12 were invited to the Classics Department at Swansea University for the day, to attend lectures and workshops on a range of topics from the Classical world. There was death and disaster galore! Subjects such as 'Daemons in Ancient Egypt', 'Death and destruction in Pompeii', and 'Cursing in the Ancient World' (Yes, we really did make curses; No, we weren't allowed to curse anyone we knew!) took us around the different civilisations, and there was also an introduction to the Greek language. Perhaps the most exciting surprise was the lunchtime visit to the ancient astronomy dome, hired for the day by the Classics department especially for the visiting schools' students. Sitting in a tent, pitch-black apart from the constellations rotating across its ceiling, university students used the dome's images to launch into stories of the various Classical myths. Thanks to Mr Rowland for accompanying us, and well done to all for throwing themselves into the activities and making the most of the day!





Ancient Greek Lessons

Some students from Swansea University have been teaching Ancient Greek to a number of our students in Years 10 to 12 on Friday lunchtimes. Four of them made it to the very end, and after sitting an exam prepared by the university, they now have a certificate in beginners' Greek. (That will look great on the UCAS form!) Well done Tom Hutchins, Mary James, Muyembe Mwanza (all Year 12) and Maira Mendes (Year 10).



Latin - Some firsts

For the first time, four students in Year 11 sat the Level 2 (GCSE) Latin language exam early, in January, all scoring A*! Congratulations to Maricci Basa, Ira Go, Gian Hernandez and Alys Williams for braving the early paper, and doing so well! Also for the first time, two of our Year 11 students (Aodhan Griffin-Barr, and Lauren Hutfield) as well as one Year 10 pupil (Johanna Dalangin) have just sat Level 1 Latin, having only attended a weekly lunchtime session. They will of course find out their results in August.

UK Junior Mathematical Challenge Solution

B: 7.46 The total length of time in minutes spent in the two bathrooms is 8+10+12+17+21+22=90. So, if it can be arranged that one bathroom is being used for exactly 45 minutes at the same time as the other bathroom is also being used for 45 minutes then the boys would be finished at 7:45. Consider the bathroom used by the boy taking 22 minutes. For an optimal solution, the other boys using the same bathroom would need to take 23 minutes in total and it can easily be seen that no such combination of two or more times can give this time. The closest is 22 minutes from the boy who takes 10 minutes and the boy who takes 12 minutes. This would mean one bathroom was in use for 44 minutes and the other for 46 minutes. Hence the earliest time they can finish using the bathrooms is 7:46.

Year 7-11

Pullover: burgundy, v-necked with official school logo.

Tie: years 7-11 official school tie.

Socks: with skirts, standard grey or white

Tights: should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and seamless.

NB socks or tights **MUST** be worn.

Blouse/Shirt: plain light blue, standard school style. Not denim or fashion.

NB During the summer term only light blue polo shirt with school logo, may be

worn (see note on previous page).

Skirt: mid-grey or black in material and standard design, knee length

Trousers: dark grey or black and standard design, **NOT** fashion or jeans. No denim, leather,

flares, leggings, skinny style etc

Shoes: black formal school shoes (leather/artificial leather) with flat or low heels. Ankle

boots may be worn in winter provided they conform to the above regulations (not with skirts). Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy boots (military, Ugg etc.) are not permitted. No forms of logo.

Outer Garments: pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules. However, all outer

garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured. Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, leather look jacket, no faux fur, tracksuit tops

or cardigans.

No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present. Hats e.g. Beanies, Baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head bands

must be plain and dark.

There is no necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at school.

Jewellery: A single sleeper or a single metal stud of minimum size in the lobe. No other

piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, glass, nose or tongue piercing. A medallion or chain may be worn if discreet. It must be removed for PE/Games. All other jewellery is forbidden. It should be noted that tattoos are not permitted.

Make-up/Hair: Make-up is not allowed. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a single

natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e.

purples, reds, dip dyes etc are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts or shaved patches (not shorter than grade 2). No braiding with a mixture of hair colours. No artificial plaits or braids. No painted nails

or nail extensions.

Rugby Shirt (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

T-Shirt (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

T-Shirt (girls): white polo shirt with blue/white side panels

Shorts (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

Shorts (girls): burgundy with white trim

Footwear: soccer, rugby appropriate studded boots and training

shoes as applicable

Socks (boys & girls): burgundy

Hooded Top (girls): black with school logo (hooded top is optional)

Tracksuit bottoms (girls): plain black (only to be worn in cold weather).

Shin pads are to be worn for all hockey and football lessons. Gum shields are strongly recommended for hockey and rugby.

All Items of clothing should be clearly marked with the pupil's name.

Sixth Form Uniform

Pullover: navy, v-necked with official school logo

Tie: Sixth Form official school tie

Shirt/Blouse: plain white, standard school style (not fashion)

NB During the summer term only navy blue polo shirt with

Sixth Form logo, may be worn.

Skirt: navy blue, knee length

Trousers: Trousers: navy blue, black, <u>dark grey</u>, standard design.

No denim, leather, flares, leggings, corduroy etc

Socks: with trousers: dark coloured, or white

with skirts: navy blue or white

Tights: plain, seamless, navy tights may be worn

Shoes: dark coloured with flat or low heels. Ankle boots may be

worn in winter and sandals in the summer. Trainers and

canvas shoes are not permitted

Topcoat: dark blue/black/grey – single coloured only

Members of Sixth Form are expected to wear the uniform throughout the school day. A single sleeper or a single stud of minimum size may be worn in the lobe. No other piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, nose or tongue piercing. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. greens etc are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts. Attendance



The Education (School Day School Year) (Wales) Regulations 2006 states pupils are expected to attend school for 190 days a year. Moreover, there is a strong correlation between good attendance and high achievement as set out below:

95-100% attendance	Best chance of success	Your child is taking full advantage of every learning opportunity.
90-95% attendance	At least 2 weeks of learning missed	Satisfactory. Your child may have to spend time catching up with work.
85-90% attendance	At least 4 weeks of learning missed	Your child may be at risk of underachieving and may need extra support from you to catch up with work.
80-85% attendance	At least 5 ½ weeks of learning missed	Your child's poor attendance has a significant impact on learning.
Below 80% attendance	At least 7½ weeks of learning missed	Your child is missing out on a broad and balanced education. You are at risk of prosecution.

The decision was taken by ERW, our regional education consortium, that no absences due to holidays during term times will be authorised by Head Teachers. This means absences that are due to pupils being taken on holiday during term time will be recorded as unauthorised.

As a school we actively encourage parents not to take holidays during term time so that children can fully benefit from the opportunities their school provides. If children are not in school, they cannot learn.

PENALTY NOTICE FOR UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE

The Education (Penalty Notices) (Wales) Regulations 2013 introduced fixed notice penalties for regular non-attendance/lateness at school. This was implemented in Swansea from January 2015.

The Welsh Government states that penalty notices are one option among a number of different interventions available to promote better school attendance.

The introduction of these regulations mean that parents may now be fined for their child(ren)'s regular non-attendance at school.

The local code of conduct, which explains how penalty notices will operate, is available on the Swansea Council website.

Penalty notices can be issued for the following reasons:

- When a pupil has a minimum of 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to unauthorised absences during the current term and bringing the overall school attendance to below 90% in the school year to date.
- 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to holidays in term-time if the absence takes the whole school attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date.
- 10 sessions of persistent lateness after the register has closed in a term bringing the attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date, or a combination of the above.

Bus Passes



Parking During Parents' Evenings
