Welcome to our new Headteacher

We are pleased to welcome our new Headteacher, Mr Paul White, who was appointed by the governors in March and took up his new post on 1st June 2015. Mr White came to us from St John Lloyd Catholic Comprehensive School, Llanelli where he was Headteacher for 10 years. He has considerable experience of working in Catholic education across the 11-18 age range. He was Head of Geography, Head of Year, Head of Transition and Assistant Headteacher at Saint Joseph's Catholic Comprehensive School and Sixth Form Centre in Port Talbot and also worked at Saint Thomas More Catholic 11-18 School in Haringey, North London. Mr White studied for his degree in Geography at Swansea University where he also went on to gain his PGCE qualification, completing his teacher training at Bishop Vaughan and Clwyd Primary School. He has taught Geography, English, Religious Education and Physical Education.

Mr White is married to Ann and has two sons who both attended Bishop Vaughan School. Mr White, whose family originally hail from Wexford in Ireland, was born and educated in Ealing, West London and has lived in Swansea since 1989. He is a member of St David's Parish and has served as a Governor at St David's Primary School, West Cross.

Mr White was a keen sportsman having competed in Athletics and Cross Country for Thames Valley Harriers and Swansea University in the past. More recently he has been a middle distance coach, team manager and time keeping official with Swansea Harriers. Mr White also enjoys Outdoor Education, holds the National Mountain Leadership Certificate and has run the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme in several schools.

We welcome Mr White to Bishop Vaughan and wish him every happiness and success as our new Headteacher.

PLEASE NOTE:

Changes to the timing of the school day

In order to increase the length of time available for staff and students during tutorial and assembly (from 20 to 25 minutes), it has been necessary to alter slightly the timing of the school day. The additional time will be used to improve the provision of pastoral care by allowing form tutors and Heads of Year greater opportunity for interaction with their students. Please note there is now only one lunch time for all year groups. We are hoping this will allow staff more free rooms and therefore an increase in lunchtime clubs for pupils.

Pullover: burgundy, v-necked with official school logo.

Tie: years 7-11 official school tie.

Socks: with trousers, plain dark-coloured or white

with skirts, standard grey or white

Tights: should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and seamless.

NB socks or tights **MUST** be worn.

Blouse/Shirt: plain light blue, standard school style. Not denim or fashion.

NB During the summer term only light blue polo shirt with school logo, may be

worn.

Skirt: mid-grey or black in material and standard design, knee length

Trousers: dark grey or black and standard design **NOT** fashion or jeans. No denim, leather,

flares, leggings etc

Shoes: black with flat or low heels. Ankle boots may be worn in winter provided they

conform to the above regulations (not with skirts)

Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy

boots (military, Ugg etc.) are not permitted

Outer Garments: pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules. However, all outer

garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured.

Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, tracksuit tops or cardigans.

No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present.

Hats e.g. Beanies, Baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head

bands must be plain and dark.

There is no necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at school.

Jewellery: A single sleeper or a single metal stud of minimum size in the lobe. No other

piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, glass, nose or tongue piercing. A medallion or chain may be worn if discreet. It must be removed for PE/Games. All other jewellery is forbidden. It should be noted that tattoos are not permitted.

Make-up/Hair: Make-up is forbidden. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a single

natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. purples, reds, dip dyes etc are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts

or shaved patches. No braiding with a mixture of hair colours.

Rugby Shirt (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

T-Shirt (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

T-Shirt (girls): white polo shirt with blue/white side panels

Shorts (boys): burgundy with blue/white side panels

Hooded Top (girls): black with school logo (hooded top is optional) **Tracksuit bottoms (girls):** plain black (only to be worn in cold weather).

Shin pads are to be worn for all hockey and football lessons. Gum shields are strongly recommended for hockey, football and rugby.

Pupils in year 8-11 can continue wearing the existing kit.

All Items of clothing should be clearly marked with the pupil's name.

DISCIPLINE FOR LEARNING

At Bishop Vaughan School unacceptable or criminal behaviour is not tolerated. This includes:

- fundamental disrespect for the Catholic faith, school liturgy and prayer
- violent, abusive or threatening behaviour; possession of offensive weapons
- dangerous breaches of safety rules and instructions
- wanton damage, destruction or theft
- possession and/or use of drugs, tobacco, alcohol or any illegal substance on the school site, on school trips, on journeys to and from school
- inappropriate use of school computers and the internet.

In the event of any such unacceptable or criminal behaviour, direct and appropriate action will be taken to safeguard the common good.

Parents will be informed; police involved as necessary.

CONSEQUENCES

- 1. WARNING verbal warning only, giving pupil a chance to alter behaviour
- 2. IMPOSITION -v recorded in the Pupil Planner (e.g. lines, extra work etc.)
- 3. FURTHER IMPOSITION recorded in the Pupil Planner (e.g. teacher detention etc.)
- 4. LETTER HOME parents and Senior Tutor informed
- 5. SLT Call Out further appropriate sanctions (e.g. detention, report, internal exclusion etc.)

Repeated failure to comply with Good Conduct Code will result in the following:

- ON REPORT with tutor
- SERIOUS LETTER home
- FURTHER STEPS (e.g. internal isolation or fixed term exclusion)

QUICK REFERENCE GUIDE

Mobile Phones and other technology:

If pupils have mobile phones (or MP3s/iPods, etc.) they should note that they are **not** to be switched on or in use inside the school. This includes the buildings, playground and playing field areas, before, during and after the school day.

Mobile phones are to be kept **switched off** and out of sight **in the school bag.** The school can take no responsibility for any loss or theft of mobile phones.

Parents and guardians are asked **not** to contact their children by mobile, (phone call or text) during the school day. If an **emergency message** needs to be conveyed the school office will take the call and pass the message on. Similarly if a pupil needs to make an emergency call home he or she just needs to approach the office.

Failure to comply with these rules will result in the phone being confiscated and kept in the school office for collection by a responsible adult.

Any pupil using a mobile phone to record sound or video in school faces the likelihood of exclusion.

The school will also invoke a 'mobile phone ban' for any pupil not obeying the rules.

No headphones should be worn or be visible at anytime.

Bullying: Bullying is not tolerated at Bishop Vaughan. It must be reported to a

member of staff as soon as possible.

Equipment:Being equipped for study is essential to being in school. Parents,

guardians and pupils are reminded that pupils should come to school

every day with a school bag for carrying books, kit and other

equipment. Pupils should have at all times, pens, pencils, rubbers and rulers as well as their homework diary/planner. Pupils coming to school without the basic equipment needed to work will not be

permitted to join their class.

Food and Drink: Only water may be consumed in lessons. All other food and drink is

confined to the dinner halls. No 'energy drinks' are permitted. The

SELLING of any items including sweets is not permitted.

Detention: Failure to follow school rules may result in detention. Detentions take

place during break time, lunchtime and afterschool.

Behaviour Reports: Pupils may be put on a report to monitor their behaviour. Parents are

required to sign this report every day.

If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. greens etc are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts. Baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances.








The annual Awards Ceremony took place on Wednesday 1st July at the Taliesin Theatre in Swansea University.



Mega Maths Challenge



We were invited to Swansea University to take part in a Mega Maths Challenge.

There were 36 teams and in total there were eight schools. We were team one for BVS the Mathletes. The first round contained three questions for each team and four questions in a buzzer round.

The second round was an observation round where you had thirteen questions on a quiz programme we watched. There were twenty points on offer during this round, so it was all to play for.





The third round was thirty minutes long, where you had to answer two sheets containing ten questions each on statistical literacy. This was a very intense round and again lots of points were on offer.

At the end of the three rounds we qualified for the final with forty two points. We had to compete against four other schools in the final round. We were given a sheet and there were eight questions called out; we had six of these right. The second part was a buzzer round with

another eight questions. We had eleven out of sixteen, narrowly beating Birchgrove who got ten. We took the title of Mega Maths Challenge winners for the second year in a row.

UKMT Junior Maths Challenge Results

On the 30th April 2015, 80 pupils from years 7 and 8 were invited to take part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. In the test, the pupils had to answer 25 multiple choice problem solving questions. The pupils in year 8 did particularly well with 17 of them achieving a certificate. Here are the results from the best achieving in our school. The highest mark attained was from Kaitlyn Millis. Geography Field Trip





Over the 18th and 19th June, more than 100 Year 10 Geography students took part in an investigation of the River Ilston on the Gower Peninsula. Pupils worked in groups throughout these days, recording



changes in the river's characteristics between its source on Fairwood Common and its mouth at Three Cliffs Bay. We fortunate to have were excellent weather for both days and the behaviour of our students was exemplary throughout. The data gathered will be used in class by the pupils to write their controlled assessment.



Comenius Project

Mrs L Williams, Miss K Neucker and two year 12 pupils, Katy Demery and Michael Monteiro Mudresh travelled to Starogard in Poland. During the visit we had to present two pieces of work based on our love of Sport in Wales and traditional games that we play. We presented our sport presentation using 'Scratch' and the presentations had been prepared by Bishop Vaughan's year 7 pupils. Our second presentation was about traditional dances.

We presented a video of the year 10 drama class performing a traditional Welsh dance to the traditional Welsh folk song - Migldi Magldi. During this meeting we were able to view the project recipe book to which all five countries had contributed. This included a starter, main course and dessert recipe from each country. We visited a medieval castle, the city of Gdansk, a medieval settlement with many interactive opportunities to dress up and take part in medieval life, we ate traditional Polish food and visited the local Catholic Cathedral. The trip to Poland was such a wonderful experience for the pupils and they are still in touch with their host families.

Herb Garden



This term pupils at Bishop Vaughan have been working hard at developing horticulture around the school site. The school council, Eco Committee representatives and Welsh Baccalaureate pupils have been help developing the court yard garden. Students have set up a gardening rota where they water, harvest and tend to the herb garden which we have installed. The herb garden now has over thirty varieties of herbs which are being used by the school's canteen and healthy eating club run by Mrs Thomas.



School Orchard



This term we have made some exciting developments in the school grounds with the planting up of the herb garden in the courtyard but also started marking out and planting an orchard of fruit trees.

Welsh Baccalaureate pupils in Year 11 helped with the hard work of digging holes, and hammering in heavy stakes to support the young trees. Organising the trees into straight lines turned out to be a case of putting Pythagoras in action!

Initially we have planted six apple trees. Some of the varieties are suitable for eating and others for cooking. The varieties themselves have been selected because they are traditional and unique Welsh varieties, each with a particular story and features to be discovered by future generations at the school.

For the time being, Welsh Baccalaureate pupils and members of the eco-club are tending the young saplings which have had flowers and are growing healthily. We are looking forward to planting six more trees with Paul Davies of Dolau Hirion Nurseries in the autumn and learning about skills such as pruning and grafting. This will add some pears, plums and cherries to the orchard.





Attendance



The Education (School Day School Year) (Wales) Regulations 2006 states pupils are expected to attend school for 190 days a year. Moreover, there is a strong correlation between good attendance and high achievement as set out below:

95-100% attendance	Best chance of success	Your child is taking full advantage of every learning opportunity.
90-95% attendance	At least 2 weeks of learning missed	Satisfactory. Your child may have to spend time catching up with work.
85-90% attendance	At least 4 weeks of learning missed	Your child may be at risk of underachieving and may need extra support from you to catch up with work.
80-85% attendance	At least 5 ½ weeks of learning missed	Your child's poor attendance has a significant impact on learning.
Below 80% attendance	At least 7½ weeks of learning missed	Your child is missing out on a broad and balanced education. You are at risk of prosecution.

The decision was taken by ERW, our regional education consortium, that no absences due to holidays during term times will be authorised by Head Teachers. This means absences that are due to pupils being taken on holiday during term time will be recorded as unauthorised.

As a school we actively encourage parents not to take holidays during term time so that children can fully benefit from the opportunities their school provides. If children are not in school, they cannot learn.

PENALTY NOTICE FOR UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE

The Education (Penalty Notices) (Wales) Regulations 2013 introduced fixed notice penalties for regular non-attendance/lateness at school. This was implemented in Swansea from January 2015.

The Welsh Government states that penalty notices are one option among a number of different interventions available to promote better school attendance.

The introduction of these regulations mean that parents may now be fined for their child(ren)'s regular non-attendance at school.

The local code of conduct, which explains how penalty notices will operate, is available on the Swansea Council website.

Penalty notices can be issued for the following reasons:

- When a pupil has a minimum of 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to unauthorised absences during the current term and bringing the overall school attendance to below 90% in the school year to date.
- 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to holidays in term-time if the absence takes the whole school attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date.
- 10 sessions of persistent lateness after the register has closed in a term bringing the attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date, or a combination of the above.

Bus Passes


