Introduction

As we draw to the close of this busy and successful school year, there has been such a great deal of academic, sporting, cultural and creative activity that this newsletter—as always—can only provide examples of the many notable and diverse achievements of our pupils. As always, it has been a privilege to witness, over the course of the year, the spiritual growth of the young people entrusted to our care, and some of the many activities that demonstrate their faith and compassion are featured in this newsletter.

Very recently, it has been a particular pleasure to welcome the pupils of two of our Catholic primary schools to perform with pupils of Bishop Vaughan in the annual musical production. Those of us fortunate to have seen their performances of 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat' would agree that their talent, enthusiasm and energy made these very special performances indeed. Pupils from all of the Catholic primary schools also celebrated with us, in early July, their first Mass at Bishop Vaughan with Year Six pupils from all four schools contributing to the Mass in a range of ways, from their dramatisation of the Gospel to making artwork that was part of the Offertory and to reading the bidding prayers that we offered together. This will be the first of many Masses that we will celebrate as a group, during what for most will be a seven year experience of the school, through to the end of Sixth Form education. Having witnessed their talent and potential at this early point in their educational journey at both of these recent events, we certainly have every reason to believe that at the end of that journey they will be every bit as successful as our former students from whom we have recently received news of some outstanding University achievements. While many, at the time of this newsletter's publication, are still awaiting their results and we wish them every success, you can read of some of the outcomes shared with us to date in this edition of the newsletter.

The numerous interests and talents of the pupils have meant that they have seen success in a wide range of fields this term, including at national level. From Aoife's success in the national '500 Words' competition, to Seb's outstanding national achievements in athletics, to Emil being selected as the winner of the Mission Gallery Art Competition, Emily winning the French Writing Award as part of the Mumbles Twinning project, Maria being selected for the prestigious Beacon's Project and to the Bishop Vaughan team winning the Under 14s Welsh Football Cup, there is such a wealth of talent that it was a natural decision for the energetic and committed Charity Group to make 'talent' the focus of their final fundraiser of the academic year. The 'Bishop Vaughan's Got Talent' show on the final day of the term will allow those whose gifts are in the fields of music, dance and drama to celebrate those gifts together while raising money for a range of good causes.

As referenced in our last newsletter, this has been a particularly busy academic year with two school inspections—Estyn and Diocesan—in the Spring term, and with our accreditation process for and subsequent achievement of the Silver Rights Respecting Schools' Award. Now that these reports are published, we are delighted to share some of the findings from these with you over the following pages. As referenced in these reports, it is always the greatest of privileges to see the young people in our care living out both the Gospel Values, for example through their service of others, and also our mission statement - "I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." They have been supported in doing so by their committed teachers, some of whom will be retiring this year, and some of whom leave to take up new posts, and it is fitting in this last newsletter of the year to thank them for what amounts, collectively, to very many years of service to the Bishop Vaughan community. Our thanks, then, to Mr. Bill Beynon, Mr. Ben Doherty, Miss Sheryl Edwards, Mr. Tony Evans, Mrs. Judith Harmer, Mr. Edward Jones, Mrs. Jayne Parker, Mr. Kevin Widlake, Mrs. Mary Wilkins and Mrs. Karen Wyatt.

School Inspections Spring 2018



DIOCESAN INSPECTION



We are delighted to share with you the findings of the Section 50 Diocesan Inspection which took place in March 2018. Further information can be found on the school website.

The inspection judged that Bishop Vaughan School is a good Catholic school that is true to the Church's mission in providing learning and opportunity for all, rooted in explicit values of the Gospel.

Bishop Vaughan Catholic School is an inclusive Catholic community in which every student is treated with dignity and respect.

Parents are very positive about the school, about its ethos and provision.

Leaders and managers are successful in promoting community cohesion, and the school works creatively to identify and implement ways to promote pupils' acceptance of difference and diversity.

Nearly all pupils are considerate to others and demonstrate care and respect for sacred spaces, sacred times and the religious artefacts in the school.

The school places an important emphasis on Gospel values based on the Beatitudes.

At GCSE, given the high number of pupils entered, the outcomes reached by pupils are very good. At Post 16, students who opt for advanced level Religious Studies attain very well.

All pupils are comprehensively supported by the school in their moral development, and have a good understanding of right and wrong. This is largely achieved due to the high levels of nurture that teaching and support staff offer for the appropriate systems the leadership team has put in place to nurture and support pupils.

Pupils are respectful and quiet when gathering for prayer. They listen to what is being said and when invited to, they join in prayer openly and in one clear pupil voice.

The systems for tracking and monitoring in religious education are robust, such that the judgements made by the school in respect of the quality of teaching and learning in religious education are accurate.

The school chapel, where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved, is used as a resource for prayer, liturgy, teaching and spiritual growth.

Pupils show a good understanding of the respect necessary when present in the chapel.

The Catholicity of the school is supported and challenged appropriately by the full governing body to ensure the school's Catholic ethos and its capacity to respond to the wider cohort of the school are at the heart of the school's strategic development.

Governors, leaders and managers welcome the diverse nature of the school's population, and are clearly committed to achieve excellence. Leaders and managers work hard to evaluate and improve the provision for Religious Education, and to plan for improvements in outcomes.

Governors give their time generously to the school and members include two Catholic priests. Governors challenge the school's standards and success appropriately with an emphasis on the school's Catholic character and success.

The parish priests are supportive of the school and its link with the parishes and community. The school values their visits and the rota that enables many of them to celebrate Mass during the year.

Pastoral care and guidance is well led and managed by a committed team of Heads of Year. All of these activities have a beneficial impact on the local community, for example through work with the parishes, the Diocesan Youth Service and the HCPT. There is also a long-standing and beneficial link with St Cassian's Retreat Centre in Kintbury, where an exceptionally high proportion of the centre's Retreat facilitators are former pupils of the school.

One especially important example of effective partnership work can be seen in the range of activities regularly and effectively undertaken by the school's part-time Chaplain. He liaises well with a good range of personnel within the school, to ensure that valuable care, guidance and support are offered to individual pupils and staff, and to wider groups within the school.

Local parish priests are supportive of the school, and value and encourage the range of links which support the crucial dynamics between the pupils' homes, their high school and their parish.

Leaders and managers strongly promote a comprehensive range of partnerships with secular and ecclesial providers, organisations and services, to promote pupil learning and well-being, and for the benefit of the whole school community, and beyond.

The provision for prayer across the school is organised and well distributed so that tutors, leaders and pupils can benefit from the weekly focus for prayer during morning worship.

Pupils respond well to the impressive range of opportunities for retreats and pilgrimages and those experiences are very positive. These include trips to Rome, and to the national Catholic Flame youth gathering, all underpinned by strong levels of commitment and time from staff across the school.







ESTYN INSPECTION

The school's Estyn inspection report was published just before the start of the summer term, and again we are very pleased to share the findings of the inspection team with pupils and their families. We are delighted that the report recognises the very special ethos and the values that bind our school community:

Bishop Vaughan Catholic School has a caring, inclusive ethos that is based firmly upon gospel values. It is highly successful in developing pupils' spiritual, social, moral and cultural values, and their sense of community.

The school provides valuable support and guidance for all pupils which impacts strongly on their wellbeing, learning and personal development.

Teachers create an inclusive and positive learning environment. Leadership at all levels contributes successfully to a shared commitment to achieving the school's aims and ambitions.

The adaptation of the curriculum to meet the needs of vulnerable pupils is a strength of the school. The 'Aspire' programme, for example, provides valuable personalised support for pupils with behavioural issues. This range of provision is successful in securing positive outcomes for vulnerable pupils.

Sixth form pupils ... demonstrate enthusiasm, confidence and welldeveloped subject knowledge. They express themselves clearly and use subject specific vocabulary well. In each of the past three years, performance in the indicator that includes three A level grades or equivalent at A*-A has been secure. The school is highly successful in developing pupils' spiritual, social, moral and cultural values, which are fundamental to all aspects of school life.

Whole-school assemblies, tutorial periods and visiting speakers enhance pupils' understanding of their culture, the Catholic ethos and their sense of community.

In many lessons, teachers create an inclusive and positive learning environment that supports pupils' subject understanding and personal development well.

They use their detailed knowledge of individual pupils' needs and interests to plan a variety of engaging and stimulating activities that promote progress effectively. These activities build well on pupils' prior learning and are supported by carefully prepared resources.

The school provides many sporting and cultural extra-curricular activities that cater successfully for a wide range of interests. This includes a variety of clubs, such as the debate club and the 'Book 'n' Brew' reading club, and trips to first world war battlefields, a local radio station and 'Flame', a national Catholic youth gathering. In many of these activities, older pupils provide valuable support for younger pupils. These activities contribute well to pupils' personal and social development.

Nearly all pupils ... feel that the school provides an extensive range of staff they can approach with any issues that arise, for example, within the valuable 'Health and Wellbeing' and 'Aspire' centres.

The school identifies clearly those pupils with weaker skills. It provides these pupils with a range of targeted interventions that have a positive impact on the development of their literacy and numeracy skills.

There is an effective range of curricular and extracurricular provision to support the achievement and wellbeing of more able pupils. Links with other providers, such as the local university, are used well to develop the interests and


aspirations of these pupils.

Pupils contribute maturely to the development of the school through the school council. For example, pupils have participated effectively in the school's decisions on their uniform. Where opportunities arise, pupils take on leadership roles and responsibilities enthusiastically. These pupils play a full part in the life and work of the school, for example as anti-bullying and language ambassadors.

The school plans and adapts its curriculum carefully to ensure that it meets the needs of all pupils. This has a positive impact on pupils' progress, personal development and wellbeing.

The school provides pupils with a wide range of opportunities to develop as ambitious, creative and ethically-aware learners. 'Problem-based learning days', for example, enable pupils to develop their thinking and collaborative skills. Activities such as the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme develop pupils' team-working and leadership skills, and a range of charity projects supports pupils' empathy and understanding of ethical issues well.

This is the first time Bishop Vaughan has had a boys team in these finals for at least twenty years. This has been a direct result of the placing emphasis on Athletics in KS3 lessons, our school leaderboard, to which pupils have responded to very well, and the effort put in by those pupils in lessons, in lunchtimes and the after-school club. The National Finals take place in Brecon later this month and the boys, although nervous, cannot wait.

500 Words

Many readers of this newsletter will be aware that the '500 Words' competition is now one of the most successful story-writing competitions for children and young people in the world. Three quarters of a million children have entered stories for this award over the years! For those that are unfamiliar with the competition, entrants write an original story on any subject or theme in 500 words or fewer and submit it online. Monday 2nd July; Emil's work will then be exhibited at the Mission Gallery for 6 weeks over the summer holidays.


This is the second year running that a Bishop Vaughan student has won this competition. Last year, Adam Charlton won with his amazing sculpture of his aging man.




CAFOD Give it Up

Reflection cards were available and made an effective visual display. As a way of celebrating and highlighting the activities, a photo booth style snap shot was taken for pupils who participated.






Books2Africa

Welsh Baccalaureate






Parents who have any doubts about what is acceptable should contact the school for guidance. The final arbiters of what constitutes school uniform are the Headteacher and Governors of the school. Please do not rely on information obtained from elsewhere.

Years 7-11

Blazer With school logo (navy) - compulsory garment

Jumper (if worn): Fine knit jumper with school logo (navy) - non-compulsory.

Tie: Years 7-11 official school tie.

Socks: With skirts, standard grey or white

Tights: Should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and seamless.

NB socks or tights **MUST** be worn.

Blouse/Shirt: Plain white shirt

Skirt: Grey knee-length skirt

Trousers: Grey trousers, **NOT** fashion or jeans. No denim, leather, flares, leggings, skinny

styles, etc.

Shoes: Black formal school shoes (leather/artificial leather) with flat or low heels. Ankle

boots may be worn in winter provided they conform to the above regulations (not with skirts). Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy boots (military, Ugg etc.) are not permitted. No forms of logo.

Outer Garments: Pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules. However, all outer

garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured. Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, leather look jacket, no faux fur, tracksuit tops

or cardigans.

No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present. Hats e.g. beanies, baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head bands must be plain and dark. There is no necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at school.

Jewellery: A single sleeper or a single metal stud of minimum size in the lobe. No other

piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, glass, nose or tongue piercing. A medallion or chain may be worn if discreet. It must be removed for PE/Games. All other jewellery is forbidden. It should be noted that tattoos are not permitted.

Make-up/Hair: Make-up is not allowed. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a single

natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. purples, reds, dip dyes etc. are not permitted); no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts or shaved patches (not shorter than grade 2). No braiding with a mixture of hair colours. No artificial plaits or braids. No painted nails or nail extensions.

Pupils, parents and carers are reminded that following the one-year phasing in of the new school uniform, all pupils in Years 7-11 will need to wear the new uniform from September 2018. Items of uniform in the old style are no longer available for purchase.

There is no change to the Sixth Form uniform.

PENALTY NOTICE FOR UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE

The Education (Penalty Notices) (Wales) Regulations 2013 introduced fixed notice penalties for regular non-attendance/lateness at school. This was implemented in Swansea from January 2015.

The Welsh Government states that penalty notices are one option among a number of different interventions available to promote better school attendance.

The introduction of these regulations mean that parents may now be fined for their child(ren)'s regular non-attendance at school.

The local code of conduct, which explains how penalty notices will operate, is available on the Swansea Council website.

Penalty notices can be issued for the following reasons:

- When a pupil has a minimum of 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to unauthorised absences during the current term and bringing the overall school attendance to below 90% in the school year to date.
- 10 sessions or 5 school days lost due to holidays in term-time if the absence takes the whole school attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date.
- 10 sessions of persistent lateness after the register has closed in a term bringing the attendance to below 90% in the current school year to date, or a combination of the above.

Bus Passes



Could both parents and pupils be aware that the children should carry their bus pass with them at all times. Pupils could be asked at any time whilst travelling on a school bus, to produce their bus pass as evidence that they are allocated a seat. If pupils have misplaced their bus pass please contact the school office who will organise a replacement.



Also pupils are not allowed to travel on any other bus other than the one that is printed on their bus pass. On several occasions lately pupils have tried to travel on different buses, e.g. to go over to a friend's place after school. This is not allowed and the drivers have the right to refuse entry to pupils who are not allocated to their bus. It is parents' responsibility to collect their children and take them to alternative venues after school.

Getting to School

Parents are politely reminded that pupils who cycle to school must wear a helmet and dismount once they enter school property. Students must not come to school by scooter as this is dangerous to both the user and to pedestrians. We would very much appreciate your co-operation in this matter.

Parking Outside Bishop Vaughan

A letter has been received from the School Community Police Officer asking us to pass on the concerns of local residents in relation to parking and vehicles causing obstructions outside the school from 3.00pm every afternoon.

Police Officers will be patrolling regularly outside the school to take positive action regarding any vehicles which are parked in contravention of road traffic legislation.



Parking During Parents' Evenings

Local residents have expressed their concerns in relation to parking outside the school and vehicles causing obstructions. Similarly parents using the school bus bay on Parents' Evenings must ensure that they do not block their car in or obstruct exits or entrances. Please park with due care and consideration at all times.

Mobile Telephones

If pupils have mobile phones they should note that they are **not** to be switched on or in use inside the school. This includes the buildings, playground and playing field areas, before, during and after the school day.



Mobile phones are to be kept out of sight, either on the person or in the school bag. The school can take no responsibility for any loss or theft of mobile phones.

Parents and guardians are asked **not** to contact their children by phone or text during the school day. If an emergency message needs to be conveyed the school office will take the call and pass the message on. Similarly if a pupil needs to make an emergency call home he or she just needs to approach the office.

Failure to comply with these rules will result in the phone being confiscated and kept in the school office for collection by a responsible adult.
