# Headteacher's Message

Welcome to the Christmas edition of the newsletter! As ever, it is very difficult to capture all of our pupils' news, activities and achievements in a termly update such as this, but we hope you will nevertheless enjoy reading about all that *is* encapsulated here! The school website's 'news' section and our social media accounts of course provide much more information again for those of you who wish to follow them.

Since our last newsletter to you, there have been some truly lovely events about which you can read more within these pages, from the Literature Festival on the very last day of the summer term to the summer results days. And what special days those were! Our pupils' achievements simply astounded us! Their hard work, especially given that this was the first full exams series following the disruptions of the last few years, certainly proved fruitful. On the Sixth Form results day, the Main Hall was full of smiling faces and tears of joy as pupils opened their results envelopes. Incredibly, half of all grades received were A and A\* grades and pupils across the year group found that they had met their offers for university courses these being pathways to careers that many have aspired to since childhood! The following week, Year 11 results day was equally special. Once more our pupils were thrilled to see that the hard work had paid off! We were delighted to hear later on in the term that the combined efforts of our pupils meant that Bishop Vaughan now features in the Sunday Times' Parent Power Guide to the top ten state schools in Wales. As a school, we know that 'grades' and 'statistics' are not important in and of themselves, but the importance that they do have lies in the pathways that they open up for our pupils. Each qualification gained means that our pupils are likely to be able to have the careers, opportunity and life chances that they dream of, and that means everything to the staff and Governors here at Bishop Vaughan. We love hearing about our former pupils' achievements and seeing the lives that they go on to lead. You can read about some examples within these pages!

The term began with those events that, while ordinary or routine, have come to have more significance and value because we were unable to hold them for a period of time: 'in-person' assemblies, the annual Enrichment Fair and so on. In addition, the beautiful Welcome Masses for each year group were celebrated by our school chaplain, Father John, and even the first couple of weeks of the year were filled with trips, workshops and activities. The pace has in no way lessened throughout the term, and indeed the final couple of weeks of this term are filled with Advent assemblies, charity fundraisers, carol services, Christmas lunches, activity days and reward trips.



The carol services have certainly been beautiful this year, and as ever they have brought together the current pupils and staff with former ones, many of whom have made it a tradition to attend our annual services at the Cathedral, in so many cases saying that it feels like an integral part of their preparations for Christmas. It is always a pleasure to see so many familiar faces gathering for such a lovely reason!

# Headteacher's Message

The beautiful design on the front cover of this newsletter was created by Riya Scaria for a Christmas card competition for Swansea and Neath Port Talbot health boards. We were incredibly proud of her for winning this competition and touched to hear that the proceeds from her card sales will be used to purchase toys and to pay for a therapy dog to visit children who need to stay in hospital over the Christmas period. Receiving the Green Flag Award meant a great deal to all of us at Bishop Vaughan, and particularly to our very hard-working Eco Team, who will be working during the Spring to build a new garden area with raised beds for fruit, vegetables and herbs, having received all of the supplies needed for a 'food growing garden' from the Local Places for Nature scheme. We commend them on their success in this, so soon after their success in being selected for the Platinum Jubilee Superbloom

# **Parish Benediction and Carol Service**

On Thursday December 8th, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our pupils had the lovely experience of offering the first of two carol services, and of course the first 'in-person' one since 2019!

Canon Jason Jones, within whose parish the school is situated and who supports the school with weekly visits, welcomed our choir, the *Schola Cantorum*, along with readers and staff, for a service of lessons and carols centred around Benediction.

The evening was a most beautiful part of our Advent preparations for Christmas—the complex musical harmonies in some parts of the service contrasted with the simplicity and silence of others. The bidding prayers provided us with the opportunity to reflect upon some of the challenges facing the world at this moment in time, and the readings reminded us of God's love.

Canon Jason's words during his reflection offered hope and assurance to pupils and indeed all attending, some of whom will naturally be carrying worries or concern given the pressures facing so many at present. They embodied the message of Philippians 4:13—"I can do all things through him who strengthens me."

During the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, we had the opportunity to pray and to remember that all things are indeed possible with God. This part of the service was held by candlelight, and the peace and prayerfulness within the church felt very special. The congregation joined in final carols before going out in to the cold December evening, strengthened, warmed and with joy after the beauty of the carol service.





## **Cathedral Carol Service**





On Monday 12th December, the second of our two carol services was held at St. Joseph's Cathedral, Swansea. The service begun with a warm welcome and with an opening prayer led by Canon Paul Watson, one of our school Governors. The traditional service of nine lessons and carols contained many 'firm favourites' and also some lovely new musical items.

We begun by listening to John Betjeman's poem, *Christmas*, which describes the busy-ness of a typical early December in 1950s Britain. Just like today, there is often lots of rushing around to buy gifts and to put up decorations. The poem however then focuses on what is at its heart - the gift of the Christ-child. One of the choir's soloists, Justine Afante, followed this with a beautifully-sung Advent call to prayer.

The readers, musicians and one of our other soloists, Amelia John, who led the lovely 'O Holy Night' supported by the choir, all contributed to making the evening very special, as did the staff choir with their item, the traditional Basque carol 'The Angel Gabriel'. The support of Swansea's Music Service in preparing and performing alongside our musicians was, ever, greatly appreciated.

It was wonderful for our pupils and staff to see so many former pupils and colleagues amongst the congregation and it was a real reminder of the way in which events such as this bring communities together and what they mean to us all.

Canon Paul, who was accompanied by our Vice Chair of Governors and fellow priest of St. David's Priory, Father Robert Davies, offered a final blessing to close the service.

We were delighted to welcome Governors, families, the Diocesan Director of Education, Mr. Paul White, Sisters and parishioners—and as so many school communities are, Bishop Vaughan's community is very grateful to be able to return to holding events such as these as they are key to our Christmas preparations and indeed to our school year as a whole. Thank you to all who contributed their talents to make this such a lovely service and to all who attended.

# **Bishop Vaughan: Sunday Times Top Ten!**

The results days for our Year 11 and Sixth Form students were certainly very special this year! It is always wonderful to see our pupils being rewarded for the incredible effort that they put in each and every day here at Bishop Vaughan. It is fair to say though that the last two years have been particularly demanding, and the pupils facing the first full set of examinations following this experience had a tough task in preparing for them. Even our most senior students, the Year 13s, had after all never had the experience of sitting their GCSE examinations!



With the true Bishop Vaughan spirit, however, those pupils demonstrated incredible determination and resilience, preparing thoroughly and with a sense of focus and calm that exceptionally served them Supported by their families, thorough teaching, with a broad offering of extra-curricular support and with a very strong focus throughout months leading up to the exams on wellbeing, our pupils absolutely excelled themselves.

The first of the two results days, as referenced in the introduction to this newsletter, was the Sixth Form results day, and — quite literally — every other grade collected was an A or A\* grade! This meant that, across the range of our pupils, ambitions for university places, courses and careers opportunities were fulfilled! It was wonderful to see so many smiling faces amongst our pupils, their parents and their teachers who were gathered in the Main Hall for the distribution of the results.



The Sunday Times publishes a 'good schools guide' annually and, despite the challenges of the last two years, it is evident that Bishop Vaughan pupils really did excel.





# **Advent Assemblies**



## The Examen



For a number of years, we have observed a form of prayer called the Examen during Advent and Lent. This is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day or week in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us.

The Examen is an ancient practice in the Church that can help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience. The Examen has taken place in every classroom each Friday afternoon throughout Advent, and pupils (and staff) were invited to spend a few minutes reflecting on their week. It provided an opportunity to identify the positives and negatives, and to feel a sense of gratitude for our gifts and blessings.

We commit to this practice throughout this season of Advent, in order to provide moments of stillness and peace: to stop, reflect and make the changes that will help us to be the person God calls us to be.

The last couple of weeks of term have been filled with some lovely activities and also fundraisers for those in need this Christmas.

Cathy Stevens, pictured below, who presented Riya with her prize, explained the charity's work: "Swansea Bay Health Charity is the official charity of Swansea Bay University Health Board. We aim to improve patient care by providing equipment, staff training, funding research and completing special projects which go above and beyond what the NHS is able to provide. This also includes the South West Wales Cancer Centre Fund.

Our aim is to create a better experience and environment for all of our patients, staff and their families. Many of our charity supporters want to give back and show their appreciation for the Health Board where their experience of certain areas has gone over and above their expectations. With their donations, we can enhance areas of patient settings and improve the wellbeing of all staff who work for Swansea Bay University Health Board."

Cathy explained that the proceeds raised from selling packs of Riya's cards would be used to support children in hospital over Christmas.



Riya stated: "I am grateful for this opportunity to express my creativity in making this card. For me, the process was fascinating.

I started sketching a rainbow design on paper. There are many cards with traditional drawings of Christmas, but I decided that they needed a little twist. I added some calligraphy using John 3:16's words from the Bible. I am delighted I got to put my faith into my card because it reflects my identity as a Christian. I did not expect to win, but I hoped the judges would like my design. When my mum told me I had won the competition, I was thrilled that my design had won. I loved the idea that my design would be on an actual Christmas card!

The charity managed to raise £300 from selling packs of my cards! They used the money to get toys and will get a therapy dog for the children! My heart was touched when I heard this because it meant I had helped people and performed an act of kindness. I hope that I can do more things like this in the future."

# **History and Politics**

### **History Trip to Normandy in July 2022**

At the end of the summer term, the History department took a group of students to Normandy to visit Second World War battlefields and memorials. The jam-packed trip included visits to the American Cemetery and the Normandy landing beaches. Students also visited the Caen Memorial Museum and the Pegasus 360 Museum, which provided a vivid insight into the experience of the D-Day landings. The visit coincided with Bastille Day, so students and staff participated in local celebrations, including a fireworks display.



Our students took to French life with aplomb, trying French cuisine such as escargot and camembert! The glorious weather, combined with the excellent behaviour of the students, made the trip a wonderful experience for all who attended.

### **Year 7 Humanities ACE Day**

Our Year 7 pupils visited Cardiff Castle for their ACE Day activity this term. The Additional Curriculum Enrichment Day offers an opportunity for students to explore their school subjects beyond the curriculum. Year 7 learned about the political and social role of the castle throughout history, as well as using map skills whilst on site. They also participated in a workshop on the topic of medieval weapons and warfare, where they were able to handle armour and equipment used in the Middle Ages. Students and staff had a very enjoyable day and learned a great deal about Welsh history in the process.





# **History and Politics**

### Mark Drakeford Digital Dialogue and Digital Dialogue USA

The Year 12 and 13 Politics students have had a very busy term so far with the fast-moving political developments at the start of the academic year! The students have also participated in two unique events in conjunction with The Politics Project. Firstly, students were able to take part in a digital Q&A session with First Minister Mark Drakeford. Bishop Vaughan was one of only 5 schools in Wales invited to this session and asked a range of questions on local and national issues. Our students were particularly flattered when the First Minister described one of their questions as the best one of the day!

The Politics students also participated in an online Q&A with two American politicians who have served in Congress – former US Representatives Elizabeth Esty and Rob Woodall provided a fascinating insight into the American political system and the differences with UK politics.









# Supercurricular Enrichment at BVS

### **Step Up Graduation**

A group of Year 13 students participated in the Step Up to Swansea Programme. This was a 3 month programme that provided online academic support and in-person subject tasters, as well as a week-long residential summer school at Swansea University.

Those students who successfully completed the programme are entitled to a reduced UCAS offer at Swansea University and were invited to a special graduation ceremony at the Great Hall in Swansea Bay.





### The Masterclass Programme Returns

Now in its eighth year, students from Years 10 to 13 have been attending a range of lectures and workshops delivered by Swansea University academics. Topics this year have included law, criminology, respiratory science and literature, with many more topics to come! As ever, the sessions have been well attended and students are making the most of this unique opportunity.

### Year 12 Study Skills Support

In October, Swansea University's Step Up team visited the school to provide a day of study skills training and support to the whole of Year 12. Matthew had a fantastic time and is now planning to apply to university to study physiotherapy.

### **Current Eco Projects**

The Eco Team have applied for a 'Local Places for Nature' Grant through Keep Wales Tidy, and we are pleased to inform you all that we will soon be having a 'Food Growing Garden'. This will include raised beds, a greenhouse, shed, compost area, water-butt, wildflower meadow, fruit trees, habitat boxes and more! This is all fully funded through Welsh Government. Please see images below for an idea of what we will see on the school grounds before the end of this academic year.





The Food Garden will be located around the community changing rooms behind T block.

Our aim is for this garden is to become a bookable space where staff can take students for outdoor activities, wellbeing sessions etc. It will hopefully also provide produce for our canteen and teach students the skills of 'growing their own'. Although the Eco Team will take a lead on keeping the garden maintained etc, it will be a space for all. We are so excited about this project and cannot wait to get muddy creating our new garden!





In addition to this, we also have 60 trees being delivered next month which will add to our ✓ 60 or 120 tree saplings - native Welsh tree newly planted woodland area as well as creating < a new hedgerow. This project is part of the national 'My Tree, Our Forest' scheme.

- varieties, supplied by Woodland Trust.
- Tree quards, canes and mulch mats to help the trees grow successfully.
- A small selection of tools to help with the planting, including two spades, two watering cans, 20 pairs of gloves, and a mallet.
- government \_/ Practical support from Keep Wales Tidy to help your pupils plant the trees on your site.
- A workshop from Keep Wales Tidy to go alongside the tree planting session, educating pupils on native tree planting, forest care and the importance of habitats for biodiversity and climate change.
- ✓ A workshop from Size of Wales that will engage pupils in an educational workshop that focuses on global tree importance, reforestation, and minimising deforestation in the fight against climate change.


"This is a touching story filled with generosity and change ... the perfect book to fill you with the Christmas spirit! It's a story with a message that everyone can enjoy!"






We are keen to nurture active, engaged and enthusiastic learners here at Bishop Vaughan. Involvement in even one or two of the groups can significantly enhance the school experience.

Parents who have any doubts about what is acceptable should contact the school for guidance. The final arbitrary of what constitutes school uniform lies with the Headteacher and Governors of the school. Please do not rely on information obtained from elsewhere.

#### **Years 7-11**

Blazer: With school logo (navy) - compulsory garment

**Jumper**: Fine knit jumper with school logo (navy) - non-compulsory

**Tie**: Years 7-11 official school tie

**Socks**: With trousers: dark coloured, or white

With skirts, standard grey or white

**Tights**: Should be flesh-coloured, medium grey or black, plain and seamless.

NB socks or tights MUST be worn.

Blouse/Shirt: Plain white

**Skirt**: Grey knee-length skirt

**Trousers:** Grey trouser, **NOT** fashion or jeans. No denim, leather, flares, leggings, skinny

style etc.

**Shoes**: Black formal school shoes (leather/artificial leather) with flat or low heels. Ankle

boots may be worn in winter provided they conform to the above regulations (not with skirts). Trainers are not permitted. Felt/fabric or canvas shoes are not permitted. Heavy boots (military, Ugg etc.) are not permitted. No forms of logo.

Outerwear: Pupils may wear standard length coats, anoraks or cagoules. However, all outer

garments, of whatever type, must be plain, navy blue/black and single coloured. Pupils may not wear denim, hoodies, leather look jacket, no faux fur, tracksuit

tops or cardigans.

No logos, writing, patterns or stripes of any description should be present. Hats e.g. beanies, baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances. Head bands must be plain and dark. There is no necessity for anorak hoods to be worn at

school.

**Jewellery**: A single sleeper or a single metal stud of minimum size in the lobe. No other

piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, glass, nose or tongue piercing. A medallion or chain may be worn if discreet. It must be removed for PE/Games. All other jewellery is forbidden. It should be noted that tattoos are not permitted.

Make-up/Hair: Make-up is not allowed. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a single

natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. purples, reds, dip dyes etc. are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts or shaved patches (not shorter than grade 2). No braiding with a mixture of hair colours. No artificial plaits or braids. No painted nails or nail extensions.

Form logo may be worn.

Skirt: Navy blue, knee length

**Trousers:** Navy blue, black, <u>dark grey</u>, standard design. No denim, leather,

flares, leggings, corduroy, etc.

**Socks**: With trousers: dark coloured, or white

With skirts: navy blue or white

**Tights**: Plain, seamless, navy tights may be worn

Shoes: Dark coloured with flat or low heels. Ankle boots may be worn in

winter and sandals in the summer. Trainers and canvas shoes are

not permitted

**Topcoat:** Dark blue/black/grey – single coloured only

Members of Sixth Form are expected to wear the uniform throughout the school day. A single sleeper or a single stud of minimum size may be worn in the lobe. No other piercings are permitted e.g. stretchers, spacers, nose or tongue piercing. If hair dye/highlights are used they should be a natural colour with no extreme contrasts (i.e. greens etc. are not permitted), no 'designs' to be shaved into the hair. No 'skin head' type haircuts. Baseball caps are not permitted in any circumstances.

Any jewellery must be removed if in the judgement of any staff, instructors or technicians it constitutes a health and safety hazard, especially in laboratories, workshops and PE areas.

## **Attendance**



The Education (School Day School Year) (Wales) Regulations 2006 states pupils are expected to attend school for 190 days a year. Moreover, there is a strong correlation between good attendance and high achievement as set out below:

#### Absence requests from school during term time

Since September 2022 we have been closely monitoring absences from school, particularly where attendance falls below 90%. Absence requests will only be authorised where attendance is above 95%. We will not authorise absences during September or during examination periods. All absence requests within term time will be viewed as individual cases.

Headteachers have a margin of discretion to approve holidays and will have regard to a number of factors which include the impact on the continuity of learning. If the Headteacher does not give permission and a parent takes a pupil on holiday the absence will be marked as "unauthorised." We would encourage parents to prioritise excellent attendance and to discuss any proposed holidays with the school well in advance.


If the holiday is not authorised then you may receive a penalty notice if the holiday means your child misses 10 school sessions and your child's attendance falls below 90% in the school year to date.

Dear Parents and carers.

We want to take this opportunity to say thank you to those that have continued to ensure that their child has attended school regularly throughout this difficult period. We understand some parents may have ongoing concerns around safety, however, we are following Welsh Government and Public Health Guidance for the safety of all pupils, staff and the community.

The expectation was set by Welsh Government that from the 12th April 2021 all schools were open, and ALL children were expected to attend.

Regular school attendance is essential in order to support children in achieving their full educational potential and supporting their wellbeing. The Education Welfare Service and schools are concerned that not all children have attended and have missed the opportunity to meet up with their friends and fully engage in their education.

As a Service we need to inform you that Fixed Penalty Notices and court proceedings will be re-instated in the near future. Attendance during this period will be monitored and if children have a high number of unauthorised absences, as well as a pattern of irregular attendance, including missing days each week and poor punctuality: there is a possibility that fixed penalty notices and court procedures may be issued.

The Education Welfare Service and school staff will continue to support children and families through this difficult period. It is now more important than ever that you as parents and carers establish positive, consistent routines with your children. If you need any support, please do not hesitate to contact us.

Let us work together so that our children can make the most of their education and experiences at school.

## **Bus Passes**



Could both parents and pupils be aware that the children should carry their bus pass with them at all times. Pupils could be asked at any time whilst travelling on a school bus, to produce their bus pass as evidence that they are allocated a seat. If pupils have misplaced their bus pass please contact the school office who will organise a replacement.

Also pupils are not allowed to travel on any other bus other than the one that is printed on their bus pass. On several occasions lately pupils have tried to travel on different buses, e.g. to go over to a friend's place after school. This is not allowed and the drivers have the right to refuse entry to pupils who are not allocated to their bus. It is parents' responsibility to collect their children and take them to alternative venues after school.

# **Getting to School**

Parents are politely reminded that pupils who cycle to school **must** wear a helmet and dismount once they enter the school site. Students must not come to school by scooter as this is dangerous to both the user and to pedestrians. We would very much appreciate your co-operation in this matter.

# **Parking Outside Bishop Vaughan**

A letter has been received from the School Community Police Officer asking us to pass on the concerns of local residents in relation to parking and vehicles causing obstructions outside the school from 2.45pm every afternoon.


Police Officers will be patrolling regularly outside the school to take positive action regarding any vehicles which are parked in contravention of road traffic legislation.

## **Mobile Telephones**
