Cambridge and Oxford offer suggested reading for each topic. They do note that they are not essential reading before an interview, but well prepared applicants may find the interview process easier if they have read some of the books.

They stress the importance of reading news articles regarding your chosen topic. It is essential to show a good understanding of up to date issues facing the subject you wish to study.
